Division of Marks- This paper may have three components of 30 marks each and a viva for 10 marks.

- [1] Moot Court (20 marks). Every student may be required to do at least three moot courts in a year with 10 marks for each. The moot court work will be on assigned problem and it will be evaluated for 5 marks for written submissions and 5 marks for oral advocacy.
- [2] Observance of Trial in two cases, one Civil and one Criminal (30 marks); Students may be required to attend two trials in the course of the last two or three years of LL.B. studies.
